How do I get an instrument?

The music staff strongly recommends that you <u>RENT</u>, not purchase, an instrument for your student at the beginning stages of their training.

Parents are encouraged to rent a quality instrument from a local music store that plays in tune and is serviceable by a local music store. Discount stores and Internet purchases often result in more problems than necessary.

An instrument repair shop should check family instrument "hand-me-downs". Instrument problems are not always visible and students become discouraged by instruments that appear fine, but have problems that are not visible. String instruments need to be sized to the student.

- Find a quiet place for your child to practice without interruptions
- · Provide an adjustable-height music stand
- Help and support practice
- Never make fun of strange sounds made in the beginning
- Help keep a daily record of practice time
- Provide a safe place to keep the instrument
- Keep the instrument in good repair
- Help the student to be on time for class and performances
- Encourage the student to play for others
- Encourage listening to professional musicians through sharing videos online, listening to recordings, attending local concerts

At school:

- Keep a record of the student's various music activities
- Notify the director if the student is going to be absent
- Make sure your child takes his/her instrument and other music items to school on lesson or rehearsal days
- Teach punctuality
- · Be sure all other classroom studies are accomplished
- Visit rehearsals and lessons occasionally
- Discuss with the director unique needs or characteristics of the student
- Attend all concerts and parent meetings
- Help with parent activities
- · Advocate for music education in the schools
